3:15pm – 4:00pm	<p><b>NAEJI Resources &amp; Assistance</b> Bill Benson, NAEJI Peggy Jo Archer, IA2</p> <p>The International Association of Indigenous Aging (IA2) has continued to champion the well-being of tribal elders in many areas that have affected older adults. Title VI is required to provide monthly nutrition and health information. Both IA2 and NAEJI offer information to help communicate and expand this conversation. Come and join us in this discussion to talk about brain-health, dementia, elder abuse and the development of NAEJI.</p>
4:00pm – 5:00pm	<p><b>Developing a Title VI Elder Abuse Program – what should be included?</b> <b>Avoiding APS Burnout</b> Peggy Jo Archer, IA2 Marcia Hall Lisa James Sonya Begay, ACL</p> <p>This session will focus on development of a Title VI elder abuse program and on staff burn-out in APS.</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1) Most of our programs don't have a formal APS program in place....or maybe they do without realizing it. What IS an APS program? When can we call ourselves a program? Do we have to have staff? Do we have to have a workplan? Do we have to file reports? Who would we report to? What would we have to do? Should we coordinate with other tribal programs who provide services to elders? What is an APS team? Would we have to work with our tribal courts or lawyers? Are there sample policies &amp; procedures for tribal APS? Would we have to work with the state? Indian Health? Would we need to be approved by the tribe?</li><li>2) Think about APS delivery in tribal communities. We're in small communities, so we may have first-hand knowledge of families and situations. We may interact with abusers &amp; victims daily. APS workers are usually victim advocates, so it makes sense that the nature of their work could anger families or abusers. How do we provide support to APS workers? How do we protect APS workers during their work or after hours? How do we protect confidentiality of staff, abusers &amp; victims?</li></ol>

This session allows participants to become familiar with the curriculum and to use it to clarify roles and as a guide to provide required caregiver program training. The curriculum was developed to guide caregivers in tribal communities and to help define the role of caregivers.
